

I must admit that it was quite hard to be enthusiastic about gardening when it was so hot and many of our plants were looking scorched and shrivelled, but what a difference can be seen in a week sometimes. Areas of the garden which were looking sad and dry have once again become a pleasure to look at.

As I write this, beautiful rain is making music on the roof.

There is nothing like good rain to refresh the soil, the trees, plants and of course all of us.

The temperature is sure to rise again significantly but hopefully not to the range which we have been experiencing for what seems like guite awhile.

We can certainly rest assured that excessive temperatures will return sooner or later therefore I feel we should continue to give more thought to making shade for these times of the future.

Gazebos, pergolas and verandahs can make gardens an even more enjoyable and aesthetically pleasing place to be.

Often gazebos and pergolas can create a feeling of grace and romance in a garden. They can be a wonderful asset to outdoor entertaining by providing much needed shade and cover from the elements.

There are many designs available which can become a permanent structure in the garden and will complement a huge range of house and garden styles.

On the hottest of days a noticeable difference in temperature can be felt by taking a spell under the canopy of a thick leafy vine.

People in Mediterranean countries have used this practice for all most for ever and it has become a part of their culture.

(I am of the opinion that we, in our country may need to practice more of the Mediterranean garden practices if concerns about global warming are proven to be correct)

Traditionally, grape vines are used. Either fruiting or ornamental varieties are equally successful.

We at our place, have grown the ornamental variety on our verandah, pergola and carport because this area is a much used thoroughfare and as bees love grapes, we did not want to risk our visitors getting bee stings as they walk along this area. As the plants, photosynthesis process takes place the leaves transpire and the air under their canopy is cooled. (Nature has it all worked out)

If you are more interested in growing fruiting plants then as well as fruiting grapes, Kiwi fruit can also work well and produce delicious fruit. A male and one or several female plants is required for fruit production.

Another prolific vine is the well known Wisteria with its glorious pendants of mauve, pink or white blooms.

These plants are all worthy plant choices to use for this purpose because as they are deciduous, thus allowing the warmth of the sun through during winter and in the summer months they are green, lush and very dense and also give the added bonus of good leaf mulch in autumn.

Of course there are many other worthy vines and climbing plants available in nurseries.

These lovely restful areas can always be made more lovely by the addition of a few comfy benches or chairs to rest on.

It is always most important to remember that it does not matter how simple or elaborate your patch is, just so long as you are happy with it and in it.

Now is the time to start thinking about winter plantings of which crops we want to put in this year.

I have already received several bulb catalogues in the mail, with pages brim full of all kinds of beautiful blooms to tempt me to purchase some.

It is time to clear summer crops, plan crop rotation and start overhauling the garden beds and preparing the soil with the addition of plenty of good aged manure and compost. Water well and top with a good layer of mulch. By doing this your beds will be full of lovely nutrients when you are ready to plant out your seedlings.

Apply dolomite around the drip line of stone fruit, pear and apple trees at the rate of one handful per square metre.

Feed clover infested lawns with aged poultry manure before rain. This will provide some extra nitrogen which weakens clover while helping the lawn fill the gaps.



#### The Eugowra Steering Committee for Shire Boundary Change

We are writing this letter to bring the public up to date with what the committee that you have elected has been doing in an effort to have the shire boundary changed to include Eugowra and the 2806 portion of Cabonne Shire in the Forbes Shire. This action was very strongly voted for at the public meeting held at the Eugowra Bowling Club in 2012.

At about the time we held the public meeting, Don Page the Minister for Local Government, announced that they were going to appoint a panel of three to create the <u>INDEPENDANT LOCAL</u> <u>GOVERNMENT REVIEW PANEL</u>. The panel were engaged to conduct a study of local government state wide with aim to rationalising, where needed, local government so as to reduce the number of councils where it was deemed to be necessary with the aim to create shires with the ability to be able to operate successfully into the future. That gave us even more opportunities to present our case.

We have already presented two submissions to the Minister and two to the Review Panel. The Panels final report has been presented to the Minister. State Councils and other bodies, such as the local committee, have been invited to submit final arguments, which we have done. That will make a total of five presentations from us.

The favoured recommendation from the Panel is to amalgamate Orange and Cabonne. The Minister may not recommend that action to the Boundaries Commission, but taking into account the fact that Orange is in a tight position for future development and the fact that the section of Cabonne that is close to Orange is some of the more highly rateable land, the Review Panels recommendation should receive a very sympathetic ear.

We are a back gate now and if that amalgamation was to occur, we would be even further away from the action centre. While generally people are decent where ever they live, we have much more in common with our neighbours just down the road from us. We would be the front gate to Forbes Shire. It has been said by some of the Forbes Councillors that it would be an advantage for the Shire to have us. We would lift their population to over ten thousand and that would be a positive result for them. We were told that that helps for state funding.

So it will soon become a wait and see situation while the great and difficult task that government has to tackle is dealt with. It is our understanding that it will be 2017 when whatever is seen as necessary to be dealt with will begin to get underway. 2020 is said to be the year when it will be finalised.

All we can do now after submitting our final case is, wait and see. Any further action will depend on what public comment is made by the Government and or the boundaries commission.

# Safety Guidelines for Eugowra Pool

**Children (under 10 years)** are not allowed entry unless under active supervision of a person 16 years or older.

Parents and guardians should actively supervise their children at all times and be dressed ready to enter a pool.

For 0–5 year olds and non-swimmers, a parent or guardian needs to be in the water at all times and within arms' reach of the child. It is best if you are engaging with your child i.e. playing with them, talking to them.

Constant active supervision is required for children aged 6–10 years old. Parents and carers must be prepared to enter the water with this age group.

For 11–14 year olds it is recommended that parents regularly check on their child by physically going to where they are in or around the water.

#### Active supervision at public pools consists of four key elements:

Be Prepared: Ensure you have everything you need before getting into the water, such as towels and dry clothes.

Be Close: Always be within arms' reach of your child.

All of Your Attention: Focus all of your attention on your child and get into the pool and talk and play with them.

All of the Time: You should never leave your child alone in the water, nor should they be left in the care of an older child or with the assumption that your responsibility diminishes due to the presence of lifeguards.



#### Coconut & Lime Chicken Salad

#### **INGREDIENTS**

½ cup Coconut milk

1 tbsp Brown sugar

1 tbsp Lime juice

1/2 tsp Dried crushed chillies

Salt & pepper

2 small chicken breast cooked (poached or baked) & thinly sliced

½ cup Julienne of carrot

½ cup thinly sliced red capsicum

Add some lime zest for extra zing if desired

#### **METHOD**

Whisk coconut milk, brown sugar, lime juice & zest, chilli, salt & pepper together until sugar is dissolved.

Toss chicken, julienne carrots and capsicum through dressing and allow to sit for 1-2 hours in the fridge.

Serve on a bed of mixed lettuce or rocket for a light yummy salad.

Serve on Chinese spoons or in shot glasses for a delicious summery canapé. Looks great with garnished with fine lime zest curls.

Or with some shredded crunchy iceberg lettuce on a Lebanese wrap for a superb summer picnic.

### Documentary About Sheep Ranching in Montana

Local residents will have a unique opportunity to see the film "Sweetgrass" on Saturday, April 5. Released in 2009 'Sweetgrass' is a documentary that follows the sheep ranching life of the Lawrence Allestad Family of Big Timber, Sweet Grass County, Montana. The Allestads were the last of the sheepherding ranches to summer graze their animals on government land in the Absaroka Beartooth Mountains. The film produced by Ilisa Barbash and Lucien Castaing-Taylor, is a breathtaking and majestic view into the Montana wilderness and into the harsh lives of Montana sheep producers. From the lambing season to the trailing of the sheep into the mountains, and to the protection of the sheep against wolves, coyotes, and grizzly bear 'Sweetgrass' is a film to be enjoyed by rural and urban people alike.

The documentary is being used as a fundraising event for the local student group Montana Bound. Jeanine Gibby, Montana Bound organizer and family friend of the Allestads, was given complete permission from the film makers to use 'Sweetgrass' as a fund raiser. Montana Bound students will travel to Sweet Grass County, Montana this winter and Barbash and Castaing-Taylor were thrilled to hear of the students' upcoming venture.

The film will be shown at St. Joseph's Hall in Eugowra. Tickets are \$10 and will be sold at the door. Doors will open at 7 pm with the film starting at 7:30. Montana Bound will provide a light 'supper' during intermission but viewers are asked to BYO Beverage. The film is unrated but is best suited for those over 16 due to verbal language used by the frustrated sheepherders. Anyone who has worked with sheep will understand their 'swearing'.

The first dinner meeting for the year of the Eugowra Evening VIEW Club was held at the Central Hotel February 3.

Guest speaker was Jeanine Gibby, who entertained members and guests with highlights of time she has spent in Nepal.

Having travelled to Solukhumbu on numerous occasions to work with schools, Jeanine was aware of the need for girls to have their own boarding house. Girls (and boys alike) who live in remote villages, often walk hours to attend school and having dorms will give them a safe place to stay overnight during the school week.

Later this year anyone with an adventurous nature could have the opportunity to help build a girl's dormitory in the village of Salleri located in the Solukhumbu region in eastern Nepal.

The dorms will be made from earth bags, cloth bags filled with dirt. This will save money, time and the backs of local porters. Traditionally porters have carried heavy loads of brick to construction sites, but by using the earth bag method the bags are filled on-site with no porter required.

The construction of the dorm is being organised by 'Edge of Seven' based in Denver Colorado. 'Edge of Seven' is a non profit organisation that promotes education for

Nepali girls living in remote villages.

Jeanine had heard of the program while volunteering with the Australian Himalayan Foundation's Teacher Training program in 2011.

# MURAL WEEKEND

9TH, 10TH & 11TH MAY 2014

This year's Murals weekend has the trappings of the best mural weekend yet! There are many more new events and attractions to see over the weekend; such as the Working Dog Trials and our Guest Artist Art Gallery. The weekend of the 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> May, is expecting up to 50 artists and sign writers to work throughout the weekend. Again the artists are coming from far and wide. The artists and sign writers are from various backgrounds and have many years of experience in their respective fields.

Thursday will be when many of the artists arrive in town. They will be allocated one of the murals in which they will work on for the weekend. The proposed Murals for this year's event are: Wykamps tribute to the Rural Fire Brigade, Stroms World War II tribute, Eugowra Swimming Pool and a mural for the Working Dogs area at the Eugowra Showground. During the weekend part of Everlyn Street will be closed for the artists to set up their paint tables and start their masterpieces. All the Murals will be painted in this one location and installed in their respected sites on completion.

On Friday the Working Dog Trials will begin at the Showground and continue until Sunday. 

There has been far too much happening in Eugowra to focus on just one business, person or thing this month!

**POLICEMAN** I am told that our new Policeman is concerned about the speed of big trucks rumbling through the town, and that the highway patrol will soon be visiting Eugowra....YOU HAVE BEEN WARNED!

I also hear our Policeman looks very young, but I cannot confirm this, as I haven't yet been able to catch sight of him. However, I do know that when teachers, police and doctors start looking like school kids, it's a sure sign of the advanced age of the person looking!

**TRAFFIC** Talking of trucks, it will be interesting to see the effect on the traffic through Eugowra when the new Gooloogong Bridge is completed. We may need to reinstall some speed bumps through the town. Broad Street has just been resealed to smooth over the bumps so our sleep-deprived residents can get some kip....

CABONNE COUNCIL I was thinking Cabonne had been quite impressive over the past month –roadwork, concreting in Apex Park, cleaning weeds from the footpath near Craft on the Creek, footpath and creek walk planning and a visit by Hannah Dunlop and Lynnette Hawkes to discuss the town notice board and the Eugowra promotional brochure. But Cabonne's good image fell in a heap when Council accepted a staff recommendation to remove the large Eugowra Industrial Estate sign (which apparently cost around \$4000) and replace it with a smaller one. What were our Councillors thinking to approve that?!!! It certainly sparked quite a bit of local fury and community action...

**EUGOWRA BROCHURE** According to Lynne Hawkes, most people who travel plan their journey "on line" before they set off. And Cabonne has no money in the current budget to produce a brochure any time soon....

We agreed that seeking financial support from businesses to fund a brochure is not fair and can be very expensive (\$300+ per advertisement). And the question arises – if a business doesn't advertise, is it in the brochure or not? If not, the

brochure does not give the complete picture of what's in our town, and it discriminates against those businesses that cannot afford, or don't see the value in the advertising.

The NSW Government does not support brochures any more because it has no evidence of the value of them. Now that "everyone" is on line, who reads brochures - especially when brochures often feature very small print on dark coloured backgrounds ... and the young folk who can read 'em, don't, and the old folks who would use 'em, can't!! No value in that!

The Eugowra brochure has been put on the backburner by Cabonne, but we do need something now. Max Swift suggested this mural might look good on the cover...(see pic). What do you think?



TOWN NOTICE BOARD(s) You may notice there are two – one at the park (Dump Site) between the Creek and Parallel Motors, and one opposite the Central Hotel in Apex Park. Cabonne has money available to finish this project. The plan is to put up a large map of Eugowra Township so visitors can find their way around when they get here. We have asked Hannah to remove the railway line and Eugowra railway station and all the streets that don't actually exist. (We can always add them later as the town expands.....)

Hannah wants us to send pictures of Eugowra scenes, buildings, murals, farming, show, crops, events, people, groups, etc so that the best can be featured surrounding the map. If you have some beaut snaps, please email them to Hannah ASAP: Hannah.dunlop@cabonne.nbsw.gov.au

She has promised that we will have an opportunity to see the final draft of the map etc before it gets printed. We also must remember to ask for copies of the map for businesses to have on hand too.

**DUMP SITE** Eugowra has a place in the middle of town on the creek available for overnight stays. Judy Smith has been collecting names for this spot, including "Sunset Strip" and "Tadpole's Shortcut". No decision has yet been made, but anything is better than "The Dump Site".

Grey Nomads, usually retirees, travelling our roads in search of adventure, are always on the look out for cheap overnight rest stops where they can pull up their van or big rig, empty their waste, fill up the water tank, and take a walk to the shops with the dog.

Some NSW country Councils are surveying the Grey Nomads to see what they want/need so these Councils can provide stop-over spots to suit. http://thegreynomads.com.au/

It has been found that RV travellers typically spend in excess of \$100 per day in a community on such things as caravan parks (17%), fuel (30%), groceries and food stuffs (21%), dining out (6%), entertainment (5%), vehicle maintenance (14%) etc.

We certainly have a great Caravan park at the showground, with the BEST amenities block, and very modest fees, but some travellers just want to stay right here in town where they can walk to everything.

Craft on the Creek volunteers report seeing many vehicles visiting our Dump Site, but not many stop overnight. WHY?

**PICNIC TABLES** The big mural down the side wall of Danny's Supermarket continues to stop the traffic. However there is nowhere for visitors to sit for morning tea or a lunch break, and gaze at the wall. Maybe some picnic tables would be nice under the trees. They'd have to be nailed down though, or we'd lose 'em down the creek in the next flood.

**PARKING** Another related issue is the reverse angle parking along **both** sides of Broad Street. That's not the brightest idea in a country town full of trucks and trailers, and certainly doesn't help the caravanners and big rigs pull up for a rest! Maybe there should be some parallel parking along the front of the Supermarket?

**MUSEUM** Our amazing Museum & Bushranger Centre has received a grant to build an extension on the back to house some really BIG items including the McMillan family's "Braveheart" wagon. (see pic)

Final plans are being drawn up and tenders for the construction will be invited soon. Museum volunteers will undoubtedly be pleased to hear that the backyard dunny and outdoor hand basin will be replaced by flash indoor toilets with proper plumbing. There will also be a new meeting room/ staff kitchen area. LUXURY!

**POST OFFICE** Yes, it's now on the **western** side of town opposite Danny's Supermarket! I suppose most locals have stopped going to the **Chemist** to post their letters?!! It must have been quite unnerving for Basem, excited by the approach of a potential customer, albeit with letter in hand, to then see them go red, turn heel and slink back into their vehicle for a fast getaway. I believe the shop keepers opposite the old Post Office have a comprehensive list of these people, some of whose names appear more than once....

Now the RTC Committee that runs our local Post Office is working on a better deal for parcel handling. Our Post Office is paid reasonably when we SEND parcels, but paid poorly to receive parcels. If only we had more online businesses rather than online shoppers in Eugowra! It **is** better to **send** rather than receive, you know!!

**COFFEE?** I see new brickwork at the back of The Gentle Cow. Great to see something going up rather than being pulled down. Michael will soon be taking a break from The Gentle Cow for another operation. We hope all goes well with the op Michael, but we have to ask... where will we get our coffee fix on Mondays and Tuesdays while you're away?!!!

**FAT LAMB:** And still we wait for something to rise from the ashes. What a fantastic view across Eugowra hills there would be from a lovely new 2 storey Inn!! I believe the hold up has something to do with disposal of asbestos, not bushrangers.

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
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# A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY



Essential elements in life are water and fire and they have figured strongly in the history of our little township.

Eugowra has certainly had its share of fires in the past. Sadly, house fires were often fatal. One reported here is an unfinished story. It is not known what happened to the other people. When the 'Fat Lamb' burned to what is now an eyesore in the township it was only one building in a recorded list of Eugowra businesses to go up in flames. 'Chesher' Hall was burned down twice and the Imperial Theatre had to be rebuilt following a fire in 1929.

**1962** saw the demise of most of the old buildings where J C Adams later rebuilt in Broad Street.



Some items from newspapers of the times included items

**1900.** Eugowra, near Forbes, the house of a man named Kent caught fire. Two young children were in the house, and their aunt, Mrs Finn, rushed in to save them. She carried the children near to the door and then fainted. She and the children go out, but were all terribly burned. They were brought into Forbes hospital on Friday evening, and the youngest child, Eileen, aged two and a half died the next morning. The other child and Mrs Finn are in a precarious condition.

**1912.** A Serious fire occurred at Eugowra on Tuesday night last as the result of which Kerr's billiard room and shop, Langford's shop and dwelling, and Mrs Maher's unoccupied shop were burnt. The buildings were of weatherboard and were situated in main-street.


**1930.** Eugowra A disastrous fire occurred here on Thursday night about 11.30 o'clock when the block of buildings owned by the Kirby estate, and occupied by Messrs.Phillip Ghush (general storekeeper), Murphy (dentist), and Toole (residence), was completely gutted. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Dancers from a nearby hall saved adjoining buildings when a fire caused about £3000 damage at Calopedis' corner block at 1 o'clock this morning. They organised a bucket brigade. Calopedis' corner is a block of brick and wood buildings, comprising refreshment rooms, baker's shop, and offices.

It seems that the Mandagery was not of too much help to the township with the publishing of the following items in the press.

**1912.** Mr L Marshall of the Post Office Hotel (pre Central) has been a benefactor to the people of the town lately. The people have been in need of a water supply for some time, and Mr Marshall partly relieved the situation by erecting a windmill and trough, and allowing residents to bring their stock there for water.

Eugowra water supply. The Boree Shire engineer reported to the last meeting of his Council that the site suggested at Marara Gully for a water supply for Eugowra is excellent in every way. There is a faultless foundation of granite at the dam site. A 20 feet concrete dam would give a storage capacity of over one million gallons, which



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could be increased, when desired by construction of other dams up the gully. The main would be 135 chains long with a fall of 28ft from the bottom of reserve. Estimated cost, including a six-inch wooden main and two stand pipes £2500. The reservoir would be just beyond the shire boundary, but landowners are agreeable to the necessary resumption of a few acres for reserve.

The ongoing saga of the water from the Puzzle Flat Creek and its diversion from the township recalls an item from almost ninety years ago, when water had inundated Eugowra's 'Newtown', area draining from hills into that creek off the Canowindra Road.

**June 1925.** Eugowra has had its share of the floods, and a good deal of damage has been done. Fortunately the Mandagery did not rise as high as expected.

Another 18 inches and all the western portion of the town would have been inundated. Terrific rain fell here on

Saturday and Saturday night and part of the next day, estimated at seven inches.

Early on Sunday morning residents in the Newtown part of Eugowra realised that they were going to be flooded out. A huge quantity of water had come down over the racecourse and steadily backed up against the railway until the whole of Newtown was covered from one foot to three feet deep. Just when things were looking serious the railway gave way, and railway yards became a lake several feet deep, most of the water came back to the town, and the culvert near the police station was several feet deep, washing one side of it away. All traffic was suspended. Pedestrians who had to cross straddled the rails. Several families had to make a hurried removal, but volunteers partrolled all day long ready for any emergency. Beyond the damage to the roads and the washaway on the railway (which was broken in three places) not much damage was done. All backyards and footpaths are covered with a thick layer of silt.




#### UNDERSTANDING CHOLESTEROL

#### Cholesterol is important

Cholesterol is a white, insoluble and waxy substance. It is produced by the liver and also made by most cells in the body. Cholesterol is a type of fat that is part of all animal cells. It is carried around in the blood by little 'couriers' called lipoproteins. We need a small amount of blood cholesterol because the body uses it to:

- build the structure of cell membranes
- make hormones like oestrogen, testosterone and adrenal hormones
- help your metabolism work efficiently, for example, cholesterol is essential for your body to produce vitamin D produce bile acids, which help the body digest fat and absorb important nutrients.



Your total cholesterol is made up from the LDL + HDL cholesterol. When you get your cholesterol checked make sure you find out both these levels.

Our body produces enough cholesterol – we do not need to eat any.

#### Safe blood cholesterol levels

Health authorities recommend that cholesterol levels should be no higher than **5.5 mmol per litre** if there are no other risk factors present. If there are other cardiovascular risk factors such as smoking and high blood pressure or pre-existing cardiovascular (heart) disease, then the aim for the **LDL levels would be less than 2 mmol/l.** 

#### Effects of high cholesterol levels

Too much cholesterol circulating within LDL in our bloodstream leads to fatty deposits developing in the arteries. This causes the vessels to narrow and they can eventually become blocked. This can lead to heart disease and stroke.

#### How to avoid saturated fats

The best way to have healthy levels of cholesterol in your diet is to limit foods high in saturated fats. Try to avoid:

- fatty meats
- processed meats like salami and sausages
- snack foods like chips
- most takeaway foods, especially deep-fried foods

cakes, biscuits and pastries.

#### Lifestyle tips to cut cholesterol

Changing some of your lifestyle habits may also help to reduce your cholesterol and triglyceride levels. Suggestions include:

- Cease alcohol consumption or reduce your alcohol intake to no more than one or two drinks a day. Avoid binge drinking. This may help lower your triglyceride levels.
- Don't smoke. Smoking increases the ability of LDL cholesterol to get into artery cells and cause damage.

With the scorching temperatures, hopefully a distant memory, it is a perfect time for everyone to get together for a giggle and a game or two.

#### UNDERSTANDING CHOLESTEROL CONTINUED...

- Exercise regularly (for example, at least 30 minutes of brisk walking daily). Exercise increases HDL levels while reducing LDL and triglyceride levels in the body.
- Lose any excess body fat. Being overweight may contribute to raised blood triglyceride and LDL levels.

Control your blood sugar levels if you have diabetes. High blood sugars are linked to an increased risk of atherosclerosis ('hardening of the arteries'), heart attacks and strokes.

#### Medication may be needed

For some people, diet and lifestyle changes are not enough. High blood cholesterol levels often have a genetic component. Some people inherit altered genes that cause high cholesterol and this cannot usually be changed by lifestyle or diet.

Cabonne Mayor Ian Gosper has welcomed more than \$1000 in State Government funding for Youth Week activities in April.


Member for Orange Andrew Gee announced Cabonne Council will receive \$1230 to help prepare for Youth Week celebrations from 4-13 April 2014.
